# Obstetrics and Gynecology Practices in Greco-Roman Societies and selected Communities (Esan and Yoruba) in Pre and Post-Colonial Nigeria: A Case of Crosscultural Correspondences.

Ancient and modern scholars have examined O&G in ancient Rome. However, the comparative possibility of methods and practices involved in pregnancy and child health in the Greco-Roman societies and in selected Esan and Yoruba communities has been ignored. This study therefore attempts to foreground the philosophy and science that informed traditional midwifery and re-establish the practices and methods utilized in the care of the pregnant woman and child, with a view to understanding the degree of its potency, its values and its relevance. The research also will identify similarities and challenges of traditional O&G and ascertain the factors behind its sustainability in those communities in Nigeria.
