(i) Still Undermining Africa? Postmodern Dialectics in Danbudzo Marechera's *Black Sunlight*

This study engages Dambudzo Marechera's *Black Sunlight*, with a view to exposing and exploring salient postmodern dialectical representations that are significantly enduring in the text. This research attempts to explore a contextual framework on which Marechera's identity as a postmodern writer is foregrounded. Also, it tries to critique postmodern techniques, such as paranoia, indeterminacy, parody and vulgarism that shaped the stylistic and thematic preoccupations of the novel. This project, which began in August 2017, is expected to be concluded in January, 2019.

(ii) Of Women, Subversion and Ecological Sustainability in May Ifeoma Nwoye's Oil Cemetery

This project attempts to transcend the discourse of environmental degradation in Niger Delta region by exploring the representation of women and their subversive roles in ecological renaissance. In contemporary Nigerian novels, women have been mostly portrayed as primitive victims of the effect of environmental degeneration. This ongoing research tries to deconstruct that notion of casualty mostly associated with women. It hopes to foreground the resolutions of the female protagonist in the novel, May Ifeoma Nwoye's *Oil Cemetery*, and explore her convictions and actions on nurturing the environment from a decadent, chauvinistic past. This study, using ecofeminism as an emerging perspective of eco-criticism, further critiques the avalanche of problems associated with women in the Niger Delta environment and their awareness of ecological damage-control. It commences in April 2018 and is expected to be concluded in October 2018.
